



EDUCATION

During fiscal year 2024, our Pitt Pharmacy Course Support Team underwent a redesign and restructure, which helped in standardizing staff roles in PharmD course support and formalized our backup support for staff. The group is an integral part of the adoption of both ExamSoft and Suitable, two new platforms changing how we assess and catalog student achievement.

The John P. and Constance A. Curran Student Center is the hub for services for PharmD and graduate students. The faculty and staff of the center have knowledge and experience to support students' academic and personal needs through direct connections to resources within both the School and the University, whether financial, health, physical and/or mental well-being, or academic in nature. Recruitment, admission, experiential learning, financial aid, academic support and advising, course registration and support for student-led organizations are examples of functions coordinated through the Curran Student Center.

Simulation in Education

At Pitt Pharmacy, we have a rich history of advancing the use of educational technology into the curriculum. Pitt Pharmacy was the first pharmacy school in the country to introduce human-patient simulation into a core course for our P2 students. With extensive research, we proved the effectiveness of using these technologies and methodologies. Pitt Pharmacy purchased diverse new simulators to enrich the learner experience, and virtual reality is used by P3 students in an elective course. New interprofessional spaces in Alan Magee Scaife Hall utilizing augmented reality and the Anatomage Table allow students to see 3D visualizations of the human anatomy.

RESEARCH-FOCUSED FACULTY

DISCOVERY

Da Yang's research is at the frontier of computational biology and experimental pharmacology. His work has resulted in the publication of 91 peer-reviewed articles, with numerous high-impact papers appearing in prestigious journals such as Cancer Cell and Nature Communications. He is the principal investigator on multiple National Institutes of Health R01 grants, demonstrating the far-reaching impact and innovation of his research. Notably, he is a key member of The Cancer Genome Atlas project and co-chair of its noncoding RNA research panel, efforts that earned his team the 2020 American Association of Cancer Research Team Science Award.

DEVELOPMENT

Lisa Rohan combines her undergraduate engineering degree with drug delivery science to develop products that are in use today to prevent HIV/AIDS through novel delivery forms. For the last 24 years, Rohan has dedicated herself to pharmaceutical product development—which combined drug delivery, research to identify needs of women and men at high risk for infection with HIV/AIDS, retroviral therapy and/or desiring contraception, and seeking protection from COVID-19. By addressing some of the understudied problems in women's health research, Rohan is changing the status quo and transforming lives around the world. Rohan served as the principal investigator and director of the central laboratory for the Microbicide Trials Network, a U.S. National Institutes of Health-funded worldwide collaborative clinical trials network focused on preventing the sexual transmission of HIV.

TRANSLATION

A Pitt Pharmacy team, led by **Philip Empey**, **Lucas Berenbrok**, and **James Coons** received a large Precision Medicine Implementation Program grant to advance pharmacogenomics implementation. The project, titled "Implementing Risk-Based Preemptive" Pharmacogenomic (PGx) Testing in Employee Health," aims to generate real-world clinical utility data on the value of preemptive PGx panel testing in high-risk populations, a PGx Risk Score capable of predicting patients who benefit from PGx testing, new clinical decision support in UPMC electronic health records. return of results to patients through MyUPMC and an engaged Pitt/UPMC clinical workforce that understands how to effectively use PGx results for precision medicine. The team is collaborating with investigators in Family Medicine, the UPMC Genome Center and the UPMC Health Plan to evaluate the clinical utility of a new 14-gene testing panel. The team is conducting a rigorous pragmatic clinical trial of pharmacist-provided comprehensive medication management (CMM) services including PGx testing versus CMM alone to determine the real-world value of PGx.

OUTCOMES

Sandra Kane-Gill's research program is focused on clinical, pharmacoeconomic and patient-centered outcome evaluations of critically ill patients and other patients at high-risk for medication harm. Kane-Gill has innovated in the field of medication safety surveillance through enhancing clinical outcomes by preventing medication errors and adverse drug events. She is pioneering the use of health information technology and implementation strategies to improve medication safety.

IMPLEMENTATION

Kim Coley serves as a professor of pharmacy and therapeutics and director of the Pharmacy Innovation Network, a practice-based research network (PBRN) of community pharmacies across Pennsylvania. She is one of two pharmacists selected for this expert panel and will help raise awareness surrounding the goals and needs of pharmacy PBRNs. Coley was recently appointed to the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality PBRN Technical Expert Panel.

IMPROVE HEALTH THROUGH SERVICE


A project by the School of Pharmacy, in collaboration with the American Pharmacists Association, highlights the importance of health care access in local communities. An interactive map that visualizes pharmacy closures was released by creator Lucas Berenbrok.

In June 2024, the Schools of Pharmacy and Health and Rehabilitation Sciences co-hosted the inaugural Over-the-Counter (OTC) Hearing Aid and Hearing Self-Care Symposium. The symposium was dedicated to gathering thought leaders from pharmacy, audiology and public health to discuss how the newest class of OTC hearing aids can increase patient access to hearing health care in the United States. Pharmacists and audiologists discussed how the professions can work together to promote the safe and effective use of hearing health care solutions like OTC hearing aids that do not require a prescription or medical evaluation. Additional topics covered included public health, regulations, interprofessional practice and practice implementation for OTC hearing aids.

The Grace Lamsam Pharmacy Program (GLPP) and Second Avenue Commons Health Center were recognized at the 2024 Community Engaged Scholarship Forum. Recognized for unwavering commitment to community engagement, they exemplify reciprocity, mutual benefit and significant community impact. For over two decades, the GLPP of the University of Pittsburgh School of Pharmacy has been a beacon of compassion, delivering pharmacy services to the most vulnerable populations in the Pittsburgh region-those experiencing homelessness, the working poor, the underinsured and the uninsured. Pitt Pharmacy faculty members Martha Ndung'u, Sharon Connor and Catherine Rebitch led the way for this program.

Recognizing that health equity must be a part of the work we do, Pitt Pharmacy faculty member Terri Newman participates in the University's Health Policy Institute Center for Pharmaceutical Policy and Prescribing annual Pharmacoequity Conference. In 2023, Newman presented a talk titled "Assessing the Landscape of Disease—Modifying Treatment Use in Sickle Cell Disease: A Retrospective Claims Analysis 2014-2021."

Under the direction of Pitt Pharmacy alum and Assistant Professor Amanda Korenoski (PHARM '12), the Pittsburgh Poison Center is a free resource for the public. Staffed 24/7 by pharmacists and nurses, the center provides expert recommendations for any potential poison exposure.

ACT-AACP Community Pharmacy Center of Excellence

Recently, the University of Pittsburgh School of Pharmacy was designated as an Academia-Community Transformation (ACT)-American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (AACP) Community Pharmacy Center of Excellence. Pitt Pharmacy is 1 of 17 U.S. schools of pharmacy named as part of the inaugural cohort. These institutions have demonstrated a significant commitment to community pharmacy advancement in teaching, service, scholarship, leadership and partnerships. Faculty and staff from the Community Leadership and Innovation in Practice Center lead numerous research and training initiatives to advance patient care services provided by community pharmacists regionally and across the nation. Pitt Pharmacy collaborated with the Pennsylvania Pharmacists Association to establish the Pennsylvania Pharmacist Care Network, a clinically integrated network of over 200 community pharmacies. The ACT Pharmacy Collaborative was established by Pitt Pharmacy with support from CPESN USA, AACP and the Community Pharmacy Foundation to accelerate and scale community pharmacy practice transformation nationwide.
