As the economy slips deeper into financial difficulties, the number of individuals living without proper health coverage is continually rising. SNPhA hopes to aid these troubled communities and influence people's perception on the profession of pharmacy.

In December, SNPhA collaborated with SGAP and Face AIDS Pittsburgh for the World AIDS Day Gospel concert and silent auction. The event was held on December 1st at 6:30pm in the Union Ballroom (4th floor) on the Duquesne campus. The proceeds will benefit AIDS research. SNPhA will also be raising donations for the AIDS organization DAHP (<a href="https://www.dahp.net">www.dahp.net</a>) that was founded by Dr. Adeyeye.

With the money raised, medications for patients with HIV and AIDS will be purchased and sent to Nigeria. Also donations will help purchase children's books to educate children about AIDS and how it can be transmitted

SNPhA also tabled in the Litchfield towers on Dec. 1<sup>st</sup> from 11am-3pm promoting AIDS awareness. Volunteers distributed information and ribbons to individuals on the ground floor in the lobby. Donations will be contributed to the previously mentioned AIDS organizations.

# A Day In the Life of a P4 Rotating Through a Federal Prison

The great thing about P4 rotations is that you have the opportunity to experience pharmacy in ways that you may never have imagined. I, for one, never thought that I would spend 5 weeks of my life behind prison walls. However, when I began to look for rotations, I stumbled across the Bureau of Prisons and it really spiked my interest.

I ended up choosing to do my ambulatory care rotation at the Federal Correctional Institution in Danbury, CT. FCI Danbury is a minimum security, all female facility that houses approximately 1,400 inmates. Within the prison walls is a healthcare clinic run by doctors, physicians assistants, nurses, dentists, and pharmacists.

Working in the pharmacy at FCI Danbury was a unique experience. In some ways the pharmacy operated similar to a community pharmacy. Orders for medications that were permitted to be "self-carried" were filled by the pharmacy and picked up by the inmate during the designated distribution period. When the inmate needed a refill, they dropped off their refill request at the pharmacy window. Inmates were not allowed to carry all of their medications with them.

Pill-line, which occurred twice a day, was used to distribute antipsychotics, certain antibiotics, and medications with abuse potential. During pill-line, inmates came to the pharmacy window where we watched to make sure they swallowed their medications. In addition to working in the pharmacy, I spent a lot of time with the other medical staff,

developing patient care plans and doing special projects.

Overall, my rotation at FCI Danbury was a really great experience. The environment was a little frightening at first, but once I got over that I learned a lot about managing complex patients.

When considering rotations for P4 year, I would definitely recommend considering the Bureau of Prisons or another division of the Public Health Service for a truly unique and rewarding experi-
