This still useful material often ends up being landfilled or incinerated—needlessly adding to the pollution problem and the cost of healthcare in the United States.

The Paul Ambrose Scholars Program is hosted by the Association for Prevention Teaching and Research, an organization dedicated to prevention research and interprofessional education.

The program provides scholarships for 50 health-professional students nationwide to

attend a three-day symposium on June 26th-28, 2009 in Washington DC. The year culminates in completing a funded community-health education project based on the student's own design.

Through this experience, students have the opportunity to interact with other health professional students and attend sessions concerning public health and disease prevention.

Last year, we participated in this great opportunity to develop leadership skills, meet other health professional students, and give back to the community. The energy present at this symposium was exquisitely motivating, and we found the speakers to be very passionate and knowledgeable about their respective topics.

Through this program, we became highly aware of the variety of opportunities that are available and the significance that we could have as a health care professional in the future in public health.
